Duration and Working Days

Duration

The M.Ed. programme shall be of duration of two academic years (divided into four semesters) including field attachment for a minimum of 4 weeks in teacher education institution, 4 weeks in a school with stage specific specialization (elementary/secondary and senior secondary) and resarch dissertation. Students shall be permitted to complete the programme requirements of the two-year programme within a maximum period of three years from the date of admission to the program.

Duration of Course:

1. There shall at least two hundred working days each year, exclusive of the period of admission and inclusive of classroom transaction, Practicum, field study and conduct of examination. The institution shall work for a minimum of thirty six hours in a week (five or six days) during which faculty and students concerned with the conduct of the programme shall be available for interaction. dialogue, consultation and mentoring students. The minimum attendance of students shall be 80% for Theory Courses and Practicum and 90% for Field Attacehment.

Deficiency of lecturers may be considered as per University Norms. If in a particulars semester, a students falls short of attendance in a maximum of two Courses, He/she would be permitted to appear in the semester examination of the paper in which He/she fulfils the atendance requirements. The course/s in which the student does not fulfils the minimum attendance requirements, he/she shall not be permitted to appear in the semester examination of such course/s and shall be declared as having failed in such course. A students who is failing short of attendance in maximum of two courses, he/she shall be required to attend the minimum of umber of lectures which were falling short, during next year when course/s is/are offered

- 2. The syllabi courses of reading and regulations for the courses shall be notified by the University from time to time, and shall be deemed to constitute integral part of the ordinances. Course evaluation under the semester system of evaluation shall be done on marks basis. If a course has both the theory and practical components, the students will be required to pass both the components, separetely. However, if the students fails in theory, but is passing in practical of that course, he/she will be required to clear the theory paper only, and vice-versa.
- 3. There shall be no condition for promoting a student from first semester to second semester. However the student shall be promoted to the third semester only if he/she has passed at least 50% courses/papaers. There shall be no condition for promoting a student from third semester of fourth semester. In case a Student fails to pass all the course/papers within a period of four semesters (Two years), he/she shall be given four consective semester (Two Years) more to pass.

Note: 1: Failing students shall appear in the examination in the regular semester examinations next year i.e. reappear of examination for an old semester shall be conducted along with the next

year i.e. reappear of examination for an odd semester shall be conducted along with the next odd semester, and even semester along with the next even semester and there shall be no special supplementary examinations.

Note: 3. If 50% of the courses / papers required to pass involve a fraction, the fraction of the course/paper will be treated as a full course. For example, if in a year there are 13 course in two semesters, the candidate will be required to pass minimum of 7 courses / papers.

Eligibility:

- (a) Candidates seeking admission to the M.Ed. programme should have obtained at least 50% marks or an equivalent grade in the following programmes:
 - i) B.Ed.
 - ii) B.A., B.Ed., B.Sc., B.Ed.
 - iii) B.EI. Ed.
 - iv) D.EI.Ed. with an udnergraduate degree (with 50% marks in each)
- (b) Reservation and relaxation for SC/ST/OBC/PWD and other applicable categories shall be as per the rules of the Central governments / State Governments whichever is applicable.
- 4. Admission Procedure

Admission shall be made on merit on the basis of marks obtained in the qualifying examination and in the entrance examination or any other selection process as per the policy of the State Government/Central government/University.

5. Fees

The institution shall charge only such fee as prescribed by the university / state government in accordance with provisions of National Council for Teacher Education (NCTE) (Guidelines for regulations of tuition fees and other fees chargeable by unaided teacher education institutions) Regulations, 2002 as amended from time to time and shall not charge donations, capitation fee etc. from the students.

*(i) Dissertation shall be submitted upto 30th April/. Under ordinary circumstances extension after semester IV will not be granted. However, one month extension under extra ordinary circumstances without late fee may be granted by Dean Acadmic Affairs and Student Welfare GNDU,

Amritsar.

(ii) Every candidate shall be examined in viva-voce on his/her dissertation.

(iii) The statement of sessional work shall be sent to the controller of examination before the start of respective semester and examination. The University may appoint a team of expert to insepect the record of the semester/practical work maintained in the various colleges for ensuring uniformity of standards.

Duration of Programme and Schedule of Examination

- The duration of the Program of the degree of Bachelor of Education (B.Ed.) shall be two years (Four Semesters).
- 2. For each examination, every student admitted under the semester system must be on the rolls of the institution and shall send his/her admission and fees for the examination through the Principal/Head of the institution, accompanied by the following certificate:
- a) Of having attendance of 80% of the total numbers of lectures delivered in Theory (Perspective Papers(P), Curriculum and Pedagogic studies (CP), Enhancing Professional Capacities (EPC) and 90% in School Internship) Program separately. Deficiency of lectures may be condoned as per University Norms. In a particular semester, a student falls short of attendance in a maximum of two courses, he/she would be permitted to appear in the semester examination of the papers in which he/she fulfills the attendance requirements. The course/s in which the student does not fulfils the minimum attendance requirement, he/she shall not be permitted to

student does not fulfils the minimum attendance requirement, he/she shall not be permitted to appear in the semester examination of such course/s and shall be declared as having failed in such course/s. A student who is falling short of attendance in maximum of two courses. he/she shall required to attend the minimum number of lectures which were falling short, during next year when course/s is/are offered.

- b) Of having good moral character.
- The syllabi, courses of reading and regulations for the program shall be notified by the University from time to time, and shall be deemed to constitute integral part of the ordinances. Course evaluation under the semester system of evaluation shall be done on marks basis. The student will be required to pass in all Theory. EPC and School Internship programs separately. However, if the student fails in theory, but is passing in School Internship Component of the Program, he/she will be required to clear the theory paper only and vice-versa.
- d) Carry out system for various semester examinations:
 - i) There shall be no condition for promoting a student from first semester to second semester.
 - ii) however the student shall be promoted to the third semester only if he/she has passed at least 50% course/papers.
 - iii) There shall be no condition for promoting a student from third semester to fourth semester.
 - iv) In case a student fails to pass all course/papers within a period of four semester (Two Years) he / she shall be given four consecutive semester (Two Years) more to pass.
- Note: 1. No special chance or exemption shall be allowed beyond what is stated on the above ordinances.
 - 2. Failing students shall appear in the examination in the regular semester examinations next year i.e. reappear of examination for an old semester shall be conducted along with

 $the \, next\, even \, semester \, and \, there \, shall \, be \, no \, special \, supplementary \, examinations.$

3. If 50% of the courses/papers required to pass involve a fraction, the fraction of the course/paper will be treated as a full course. For example, if in a year there are 13 courses in two semesters, the candidate will be required to pass minimum of 7 courses/papers.

e) Of having secured at least 40% marks in the sessional work in all the parts and their

components as mentioned in B.Ed. Syllabus.

The candidate shall treated to be failing in the courses offered in the semester in which he has not sought admission/dropped the semester and such courses/papers in which the candidate has failed shall be taken into account while deciding the promotion of the candidate in subsequent semester as per the condition. The candidate shall be required to seek admision into second semester examination as a regular candidate at the end of the prescribed duration course, but within the maximum time allowed to pass a course as given in the ordinances, provide that he fulfills all other requirements under the prevailing ordinance. Regular students admission and pay prescribed fee to the college/university in the very first semester of their admission and pay prescribed fee to the college/university. Direct admission to second semester is not allowed. The same rule shall apply to private and capacity enhancement program students.

The above said shall also apply to all such courses in which admission to a college is a prerequisite as a regular students.

Eligibility:

- 3. The B.Ed. examination shall be open to only those graduate and postgraduate of guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar / other recognized Universities who had been admitted to B.Ed. Program strictly on the basis of their relative merit in Pre-B.Ed. Entrance Test (if any) conducted by Guru Nanak Dev University, Amritsar or any other University, on behalf of the Punjab Government or any other procedure laid down by Punjab Government.
- 4. a) Candidate with atleast 50% marks in the bachelor degree and / or in the masters degree in the science / social science / Humanity / Bachelors in Engineering or Technology with specialization in Science and Mathematics with 55% marks or any other qualification equivalent thereto, are eligible for admission to the programme.
 - b) The reservation and relaxation for SC/ST/OBC/PWD and other categories shall be as per the rule of the central government/state government, whichever is applicable.
- Every candidate shall submit his/her admission form to the Register through the Principal of the College he/she has most recently attended.

Fees:

 According to the Schedule, every candidate shall pay such fees to the University as the Syndicate may prescribe from time to time.

House Examination (B. Ed.) /M. Ed

The college will conduct one unit and one house examination in I, II and IV semester. There who fail to clear the conditions in house exams will be given a third chance. The institution has a well-equiped computer lab to cater to the dual need of the institution namely academic as well as organizational. It has 25 Pentium IV computers with latest software.

The college psychology lab is equipped with tests and manuals which can be applied to diverse areas of research in education. The test include achievement tests, aptitude tests, intelligence test, personality, creativity, motivation & many other tests are available.



Educational Technology Lab:

The institution has a well equipped technology lab with Multimedia, Projector, Slide projector, a big screen and is enriched with large number of CD's VCD's and DVD's related with different curricular aspects. Teacher trainees are educated to make optimum use of technology in their practice teaching and regular learning.





Science Lab :-

The college has a spacious fully equipped science lab for Life science and physical science.

Language Lab :-

The college has a well equipped language laboratory to develop language proficiency among students.



Social Science Lab

These are well equipped with the latest teaching learning aids and are used for the effective teaching of social sciences.

These are well equipped with the latest teaching learning aids and are used for the effective teaching of mathematics.

In addition to the spacious playground the college has a yoga room and facilities for indoor games for the all round development of the personality of prospective teachers.

The institution has a separate spacious seminar hall. It is fully equipped with the latest technological equipment.

Another feather in the cap of the institution is the provision of transport facility to students and staff coming from adjoining areas.



Multipurpose Hall

The institution has a separate spacious multipurpose hall with a sitting capacity of 300 students.



College Canteen :-

It is a perfect junction for students to relax, chat & eat. It is spacious and well maintained.



Hostel:-

Hostel facility with modern amenities is available for the students. A homely environment is maintained in the hostel. Security, food & discipline are well maintained.

Library / Hitendance / Leave / Hostel Rules

a) Library Rules:

Each student will be issued library cum identity card which the student will have to keep in her possession. In case eard is lost duplicate card will be issued on payment of Rs. 50/-. Card can be checked at any time.

Three books are issued to every student at a time for a period of two weeks & 4 weeks to staff. However, books can be renewed for another two weeks at the sole discretion of the college Librarian.

A tine of Rs. 50/- per book per day will be charged for the books returned after the due date.

Reference books, rare books, periodicals and journals are not issued except for consultation in the library only.

Books issued from the Library should be kept very carefully and in no case these be underlined or disfigured, if a book is already damaged in any form, it should be got checked and brought to the notice of the issuing authority otherwise the students shall be responsible for the damage.

The borrower shall be required to replace the books lost by her.

Perfect silence is required to be observed by the students in the reading room and they should not disturb the within atmosphere in any way.

Bags, purses, files, personal books etc will be kept outside the library.

b) Attendance/Leaves Rules:

Punctuality & Regularity as given below are the chief characteristics of a good teacher. To teach these values to our students, the institution has laid down few rules regulations.

The college will commence with first period at 9 a.m. (both in summer and winter).

Mobile are not allowed in the College campus.

Absence from the house examination is taken seriously.

Attendance will be taken in each period. It is compulsory for all students to attend the classes regularly in order to make eligibility for university examination. Students should attend at least 75% lectures in B.Ed./M.Ed & least 90% in D.El.Ed

After the end of each month, lecture record of each student in each paper is displayed on the notice-board. In case of any discrepancy, the student should contact the concerned teacher immediately and get the error rectified. The students who remain absent from the college without taking permission from the head of the institution have to pay heavy fine.

Applications for leave are entertained only on the printed leave application forms available from the college office. Leave up to two days is granted by the tutor. Any leave for more than two days is granted by the principal but on recommendation of tutor.

Leave will be granted to the trainees only if their applications are counter signed by their parents/guardians.

Leave has to be sanctioned from the head of the institution but the leave taken during the session won't help the student in condonation of lectures so students leave on medical or marriage, etc. grounds will run the risk of lecture shortage.

The students cannot avail any leave without prior information to the office. Medical leaves should be supported by Medical certificate.

- All serious breaches of college discipline and long absence without leave shall be deal with punishment which may even extend to expulsion. Over staying the sanctioned leave is taken as a serious offense.
- A very serious notice is taken of those students who absent themselves from the
 college or from practicing school without getting sanctioned leave.
- Hostelers are to inform the hostel warden for any kind of leave to be taken, otherwise disciplinary action will be taken against these students.

c) Hostel Rules

Each hosteler shall be responsible for obeying the following rules.

- Mobiles are not allowed in the Hostel. If found then fine will be charged and mobile will be snatched.
- Study time has to be observed from 8.30 p.m. to 10.30 p.m. strictly, during this period students are not allowed to go to others room.
- Students will be assigned a seat in hostel as and when available.
- No students shall keep any unauthorized person (male/female) in the room, if a hosteler is found to have a person in her room, she will be liable for disciplinary action.
- Hosteler are responsible for cleanliness & good upkeep of rooms. Every Saturday, rooms will be inspected by Faculty/Warden/Housekeeper.
- Any damage to room or furniture should be reported to the Warden/Housekeeper.
- No hosteler will remain absent from hostel without written permission of Warden/Principal.
- Every hosteler should make entry in the departure register before leaving the hostel during night pass or outing pass.
- Hostel attendants are under control of warden/Housekeeper. No person is to be sent out for personal work without permission from the warden.
- Hostelers are not allowed to keep valuables, cash or gold jewellery in the hostel. Authorities will not responsible for any loss.
- Students are not allowed to conduct meetings/strikes in hostel. In case any students is found guilty, she will be expelled from college & hostel.
- Ragging is strictly forbidden.
- All students must be present for attendance at 7:00 p.m.
- All meals must be taken in the dining room at the proper time. No one is allowed to take away glasses, dish and furniture's outside the dining rooms.
- Electric appliances like heaters, irons, TVs, heat convertors or electric rods, Mobile charger are not allowed in rooms. If found guilty, the concerned hosteler will be f i n e d Rs. 500/- per item.
- Main gate will be locked at 8:00 p.m.
- Hosteler have to submit passport size photographs of four relatives for making identity cards so that only they can visit the hosteler. The visitors must present the identity cards at the hostel entrance and make the necessary entry in the register, kept for this purpose.
- The room of any hosteler is liable to be inspected by the authorities including Warden/Housekeeper at any time of day or night.

- Only those visitors can visit who are authorized by parents.

Rules for sick students

- Sick students must inform the Warden/Housekeeper about the need of any special diet before 7.00 a.m. to 7.00 p.m.
- Sick leave form can be obtained from the Warden/Housekeeper. Sick leave form must be submitted to class teacher after getting consultation with Principal/Hostel warden.

College Uniform

College Uniform comprises Purple suit with Purple Dupatta & Black Sweater for B.Ed. students and Pink suit with Pink Dupatta and Black sweater for ETT students. Shades of the colours are to be recommended by college authorities.

House System

After the admission, each student is allotted a house. The chief aim of the different houses is to develop in the students a kind of fellow-feeling as well as their individual personality development. The major function of these houses is to organize various inter-house competitions including, curricular as well as co-curricular activities. Moreover, the students can discuss their personal and academic problems with their teacher-incharges (tutors) during the house-meeting which is conducted once a week. - Annual Sports day which encompasses competitions in various events like Races,
 Long Jump, Short-put, javelin-throw etc.
- 13. Activities related with moral values.
- 14. Out reach programmes/awareness programmes.

Morning Assembly

Our education programme largely concentrates on values and provides the experience of morning assembly to the students every day. These assemblies are conducted by various houses and house students. They will be responsible for the preparation and smooth conduct of this event. The house-incharge provides the important guidelines to the students to organize the event in successful manner.

Various clubs & committees, student council and grievance redressal cell are formed to sensitise the pupil teachers towards all round development of the personality.

Prizes @ Role of Honour

Any kind of reinforcement is essential to drive the students toward their progress in their future life. This institution has always given due place to prizes and rewards. Special prizes are awarded to the deserving students for their best performance in academic field, curricular activities skill-in-teaching, sports, etc. and also to those students who maintain 100 percent attendance in all subjects or in a particular subject.

Apart from these prizes, there is a special provision of merit certificate for those students who attain first position in the university exams.

Model and Micro Lesson Programme

To make the pupil teachers acquaint with latest methodologies and the skills required for their professional development. The subject teachers will deliver the model lessons with relevant teaching aids. The pupil-teachers will get an opportunity to observe the systematically planned lesson being delivered by their respective subject-teachers in the actual class-room conditions. The pupil teachers will be allowed to discuss their doubts after the presentation of the lesson and their teacher satisfies them with proper clarification. The pupil teachers will also get an opportunity to observe and then to deliver the micro-lessons in simulated conditions so that they will be able to acquire the teaching skills before going to block-teaching practice.

Block Teaching Practice

After attending the programme of model and micro lessons, pupil-teachers will be sent to different schools for their practice in the actual class room and the school environment. The distribution of the pupil teachers in various schools will be done in systematic manner according to the requirement of the subject teachers in that particulars school. The institution will also assign a supervisory duty to its own teacher in each school. The teacher incharge makes sure that the training programme runs smoothly. The pupil teachers have to be disciplined and have to obey all kinds of rules & regulations as mentioned by the head of the school.

Micro & Composite Discussion Lessons

The pupil teachers have to deliver four composite discussion lessons i.e. two in each teaching subject and two micro-discussion lesson-one in each teaching subject. Pupil teachers have to plan, write, make corrections and finally record the discussion lesson in note-book. Each student has to present the planned lesson in the presence of the teacher-incharge. During their presentation, the teacher-incharge as well as the peer group note-down the observations regarding the presentation. The teacher-incharge also makes evaluation of the presented lesson out of 100 marks.

Long Teaching Practice

The second school experience programme for pupil teachers will be organized from April to May. The pupil teachers will be allotted the same schools as were allotted for the block-teaching practice. The pupil teachers have to obey the rules & regulations like the previous programme. They have to plan and maintain the record of practice lesson regularly in their practice note books. The pupil teachers get the practice note book signed by the teacher incharge and obtain a completion certificate from the head of the institution of having delivered 60 lessons (with a break up as 25 composite lessons and 5 micro lessons for each teaching subject offered). The long teaching practice is continued till the commencement of the final skill in teaching examination. The final skill-in-teaching exam will be conducted in a real class-room situation. The evaluation of the final discussion lesson is made on the basis of presentation of that lesson, teaching practice and earlier discussion lessons delivered during the year.

Internal Assessment

To evaluate the continuous progress made by the pupil-teachers throughout the year, each theory paper carries 20 marks out of 100 as internal assessment. This internal assessment is given by the respective subject-teacher. This assessment is given on the basis of:

I. Two house tests

1st test 5 marks

IInd test

5 marks

II. Practical work mentioned in the syllabus of each theory paper carries a weightage of 10 marks for the purpose of internal assessment.

Besides two house tests, combined written test of the theory papers is given to the students on Saturday after every fortnight. It is compulsory for every students to appear in this fortnightly test as the marks obtained by the students in these tests also carry weightage in marking internal assessment. Passing in internal assessment is a pre-condition for eligibility to the university examination. A student, who does not take both the house tests whatever be the reason, automatically becomes ineligible for the university examination.

Guidance & Placement Cell

The institution makes strenuous efforts to make provisions for their placement in the established institutions from time to time. The teachers provided them the necessary guidance to prepare their curriculum vitae professionally. At the time of discussion lessons, the near by school principals are called to observe the lesson of the students & they may select appropriate future teachers for their schools as per their requirements. Even on the demand of school principals students are sent for placement in schools. Some students are selected even during teaching practice.
